

VALEDICTORY ADDRESS | Friday 07 February 2020

Deputy Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, distinguished guests, faculty, graduates and their guests.

I am honoured and grateful to be standing here tonight to give the valedictory speech on behalf of my fellow graduates. Those of us graduating tonight have much to celebrate and to be thankful for. I would love to thank all our guests for joining us on this special occasion.

These foundational postures are something that believers noticed in the life that Jesus lived.

My experience at the University of Divinity has taught me many things, and in several ways, I am a vastly different person today than I was when I entered my first class last year.

One of the most notable changes that I have experienced has been the transformation of my understanding of Christian leadership. The nature of Catalyst has provided me and other graduates a consistent way to reflect through the big, varying experiences that have helped shape our perspectives. For me everything has changed, my understanding of creation, redemption, God and everything in between. Having walked
