This thesis argues that the person of Saint Thérèse of Lisieux (1873-1897) is connected to the way in which non-heroic sanctity is portrayed in the literary tropes of the Good Priest and Virtuous Woman of nineteenth and early twentieth-century French literature.

This research, the first of its kind in Australia, interviewed 14 adults with intellectual disability, seeking their experience and meaning of spirituality. What did they say is important for them? Outcomes included development of new policy statements with recommended responses by faith communities and Australia's National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS).

This thesis explores the concept of authenticity and argues that authentic selfhood is a theological imperative. It examines the anthropology of John Macquarrie as a basis for a theological understanding of authentic selfhood before providing and defending a theological definition of authentic selfhood as "[the] bringing of one's unique, God-inspired self to life."

Thesis: Divine and Roman Warriors: The Roman Imperial Cuirass in 1 Thessalonians 5:1-10

This thesis adopts Socio-Rhetorical Interpretation to examine Paul's use of armour language in 1 Thessalonians 5:8. Specific consideration is given to the blending of imagery from Roman Imperial cuirass statue types and the Divine Warrior motif. Rather than emphasising eschatological alertness, the merging of these figures informs the identity of the ekklēsia in Thessalonica.

Thesis: The Christ Who Embraces: An Orthodox Theology of Margins in India

This thesis develops a Christological response to Orthodox Christian mission in the context of caste dynamics among St. Thomas/Syrian/Orthodox Christians in India. In the context of Dalit social and theological concerns, it intends to offer a casteless Orthodox theology of mission that envisions a reconciling mission through a miaphysite Christological embrace or kiss of peace.

## University Medal, 2020

Citation: Dr Jacob Joseph has completed a doctoral thesis of exceptional quality which has significance for Indian and global theology into the future. His thesis, The Christ who Embraces: An Orthodox Theology of Margins in India, engages in both Dalit and Orthodox theology, developing a constructive rereading of accepted concepts and practices. The thesis challenges the existing structures of knowledge, especially regarding a multicultural, yet deeply stratified, Indian society. Dr Joseph's reading is passionate and ingenious, presenting audacious arguments with conceptual clarity and accuracy.

#### THE UNIVERSITY BADGE

The University Badge represents its Vision, Mission, and collegiate identity. The Badge is a star, formed by a constellation of open books. The star is a biblical symbol that appears in the heavens to point wise ones on earth towards the Christ. It is also an Australian symbol, as shown by the federal star and the Southern Cross on the Australian flag.

The books which make up the star represent wisdom, and are open to critical interpretation. The gathering of these many parts into a whole expresses the collegiate shape of the University.

The gold represents excellence. The distinctive accent is red, representing passion and sacrifice which facilitate and flow from the study of divinity.

The constellation of books creates two stars, one on the outside and one on the inside, illustrating the University's commitment to tradition and innovation. Through critical study, the University brings ancient truths into dialogue with the issues of the contemporary world.

#### THE UNIVERSITY MACE

The University Mace was commissioned in 2017 from F. J. Rocca Silversmiths in Carlton, Victoria. The Mace is based on the University Badge, which appears at the tip of the Mace on a head of brass.
