ABOUT THE RECIPIENT AND GUEST SPEAKER

The Reverend Canon Dr Gregory Jenks has made a sustained and distinguished contribution to theological education in Australia. He has been involved in theological education for more than forty years, including full-time positions at St Barnabas College (Adelaide College of Divinity, Flinders University) and at St Francis College.

Dr Jenks has provided leadership in theological education at St Francis College at significant times in the College's history, notably his work as Academic Dean as St Francis College transitioned from membership of the Brisbane College of Theology (BCT) to enrolment with Charles Sturt University.

Dr Jenks has demonstrated leadership in various expressions of theological education, as the associate director of the Westar Institute (1999-2001), the Dean of St George's College in Jerusalem (2015-2017) and Dean of Christ Church Cathedral, Diocese of Grafton (2017-2022).

Since 'retiring', he has returned to St Francis College and has assisted with the preparation of new curriculum and delivery of units of study with the University of Divinity, alongside locum tenens work in parishes involved in transition processes.

Dr Jenks is the Coin Curator for the Bethsaida Excavations Project, the archaeological work done at Et-Tell. As the Executive Director of the Centre for Coins, Culture and Religious History (CCCRH), he ensures that researchers can access online photographs of each item, that some items are on public display at St John's Cathedral in Brisbane and that there are teacher resource packs for schools and colleges.

Dr Jenks engages with the wider community in areas of religion consistent with the University of Divinity's mission and vision and has made a significant contribution to both formal and informal theological education in Australia and beyond.

Abstract: This thesis explores the dynamics of interpersonal and political reconciliation through the Joseph Story. By looking closely at the story's language and composition history, it reveals how ancient ideas of reconciliation and forgiveness were complex and could develop over time. The analysis is supported by looking at how subsequent edits to the Joseph Story could shift the audience's understanding of these concepts.

Abstract: A praxis of shalom is proposed as a response to antidiscriminatory social practice in Aotearoa/New Zealand. This praxis is underpinned by a theology of particularity. A movement toward shalom is generated when grace as gift and responsibility constructs communities and encounters that embody shalom at the borders created by difference.

Abstract: Through a socio-rhetorical critical reading of the distinct style and incarnational claim of the Fourth Gospel, this thesis established that the theological intent of the gospel is to construct an invitational space through which the reader may encounter and experience God's eternal presence in the circumstances of this worldly life.

The University Medal may be awarded by the Academic Board of the University to a student of the University who has completed a doctoral thesis of exceptional quality. Commissioned in 2016, each medal is hand-crafted by Melbourne artist Michael Meszaros.

Donna Maree Neander Yarra Theological Union

Dr Neander has completed a doctoral dissertation of exceptional quality which argues that the Fourth Gospel constructs textual spaces through which the reader is invited to encounter and experience God's eternal presence in the circumstances of life.

The thesis, entitled *A Reading of Time, Place and Invitational Space in the Fourth Gospel*, reads passages from the Fourth Gospel, examining time, place and rhetorical construction through the hermeneutical insights of Elisabeth Schüssler Fiorenza and Vernon Robins, incorporating a range of postcolonial perspectives.

Dr Neander's thesis is praised as providing a fresh and compelling exploration of the Fourth Gospel's use of time and place as theological constructs, that demonstrates a high level of methodological sophistication. The thesis is described as original, in conception and expression, discerning a "biblical spirituality" of encounter based in an interpretation of bodily resurrection that is perceptive and persuasive.
